MAJOR GOALS:

My program will provide technical assistance and problem solving research to the more than 4,000 small family farmers in Fresno County (those grossing < \$250,000 per year). The

technical assistance includes everything from site selection and planting to harvesting, postharvest, and marketing. Research trials address issues identified as economically important to a significant number of my clientele. A large component of my program is the assistance to SE Asian farmers (Hmong, Lao, Mien) and other minorities in the county, including Hispanics and African Americans.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS AND IMPACTS:

Extending Knowledge

I spoke 32 meetings during this period. Of this number I coordinated or co-sponsored 18 meetings locally. I was invited to speak and present a poster for the American Society for Horticultural Science annual meeting in Louisiana (ASHS), a professional organization, and was invited to speak at a national meeting organized by the Office of Refugee Resettlement and Institute for Social and Economic Development (ISED) in Washington DC.

I believe very firmly in maintaining good contacts with my clientele and regularly make farm visits to many of them in the county – more than 300 per year. Below is a summary of the speaking engagements for 2006. Many of my meetings and presentations are provided in English as well as several other languages – 12 in English/Hmong and 3 in Spanish.

Impacts:

Labor Issue: We have more farmers concerned about workers compensation insurance and have physically taken or helped fill out forms for an additional 4 farmers this year to get quotes from an insurance company. We have made some significant progress in working with Senator Cogdill's office to introduce legislation and amendments for the Labor Code of California. This is a joint effort with Neisi Farmers League and NHAf.

Food Safety: I have been asked by 13 Hmong farmers and 2 White for instructions and dilutions for adding chlorine to wash water tanks so that they can implement better food safety standards in their farming operations. This was a result of the presentations I made at several HAC-UCCE training meetings and the Food Safety forum Idid in collaboration with Shannon Mueller and Connie Schneider and other agency partners.

Fruit trails and Farmer Marketing: I collaborated (and still am) with Community Alliance for Family Farmers (CAFF), Fresno EOC, and other organizations to help market specialty produce from our farmers in Fresno County. Opportunities have opened up with Kaiser Hospital, other UC Campuses and local school districts through this joint effort. We currently have 23 farmers who are marketing some of their produce through the above collaboration. We have also been successful in opening a possible market for our sugarcane growers with a distillery in the Bay Area. 13 farmers are participating on that project we have with NHAf. The Farm Trails map started 2 years ago has drawn in additional farmers wanting to participate and the quality of the maps has improved greatly. We work closely with the Fresno Office of Tourism.

Collaborations: We have always had very good collaborations with other agencies and organizations in the past. This past year many of the partner-collaborations were even further solidified with 1/ the re-implementation of the "Small Farm Resource Network 2/ the close work with Fresno EOC, CAFF and the ties we have developed with the US Human and Health Services (Office of Refugee Resettlement) and other organizations. We are currently partnering with the above, as well as with Fresno State University, Opening Doors Inc in Sacramento,

USDA-RMA, UC SAREP, Metro Ministeries, Dr. Toulou Thao, USDA-ARS, California Rural Studies (Davis), African American Farmers Org, and USDA-RD on various funded projects.

ADMINISTRATIVE

I supervise a Hmong assistant, Michael Yang, whom I have employed for 11 years. I devote time in providing direction and help coordinating many of his outreach activities to Laotian (Hmong, Mien, and lowland Lao) farmers. Together we develop a program that addresses the needs of the SE Asian clientele in Fresno County. We completed our eighth year with a 30-minute bi-weekly Hmong radio broadcast. I edit and approve the scripts, secure the annual contracts (arranging for the three partners that share the \$2,300 cost), and am a guest on the show three to four times a year. The radio program is a collaboration between our office, the UCD Small Farm Center, USDA–Risk Management Agency, and USDA-Farm Service Agency. Michael also works closely with at least four other Community Based Organizations (CBO’s) to plan about 10 workshops each year for the Laotians, at which I am usually a speaker. Michael provides translation for me and other guests. He is also a certified pesticide safety trainer and does a significant amount of training himself. He also helps me with research projects I have on individual farms and projects at the UC Kearney and Westside Field Stations – planting, cultural practices, harvest, data collection, and data entry. Michael has attained

statewide and national recognition for his work with Laotian refugee farmers. I take a very serious role in providing opportunities for his advancement and professional training.

IMPACT: The County Director, Small Farm Program, and I were successful in getting Michael's position on permanent funding with UC-DANR which was a major accomplishment.

RESEARCH

1. **Mini Watermelon Variety Trial** – collaborator Shannon Mueller
evaluation of 9 varieties in 2 different locations of the county. Data to still be analyzed

Impact: Three calls during the year asking about seed sources, and interviews for 2 magazine articles.
2. **Cherry Tomato Variety Trial** – UCKAC
Evaluation of 26 different cherry and grape tomato for the Fresno Area. Data to still be analyzed.

Impact: At least 6 growers are planting grape tomatoes to sell to farmers markets.
3. **Garlic White Rot trial.** PI is Shannon Mueller. I am a cooperator. Report is finished and on-line at <http://cefresno.ucdavis.edu>.
4. **Lemongrass Planting methods** – evaluation with black plastic. Data to still be analyzed.
A comparison of planting with and without plastic for weed control and water conservation.
5. **Strawberry variety Trail** – with a grower cooperator.
A regional trial with UCCE Merced (Maxwell Norton) and UCCE San Joaquin (Benny Fouche). We are evaluating 9 varieties of strawberries for disease, yield, and taste. Data to still be analyzed.
6. **Zucchini Summer Squash Variety Trial and Virus evaluations** -
We are evaluating 16 different squash varieties for yield, color, shape, length, and virus susceptibility for late summer plantings.

I have been session chair for Urban Ornamental and Vegetable sections four times and presented six papers over the last 19 years. My latest presentation in 2001 was “Solarization and Plasticulture in Specialty Vegetables.”
3. California Agricultural Production Consultant’s Association (CAPCA) - I have been a member since 1988 and served on the Bay Area local chapter board for six years (1990-96). I was education chair for the local Bay Area Chapter (1992-96). This non-profit organization is the main professional organization for more than 3,000 Pest Control Advisers (PCA’s).
4. Pesticide Applicators Professional Association (PAPA) - I have been a member of PAPA since 1986. I was one of the original board members that started the organization with founder, John Ford. I was on the executive board for eight years (1986-95), and was the statewide and local chapter education committee co-chair from 1991-95. This non-profit organization is the main professional society for the more than 12,000 qualified applicators – QAL and QAC. I gave one presentation on July 12, 2005.

In 2003 I served on the local chapter “review committee.” The local chapter has been part of the organizing committee for the three (2000, 2001, 2005) San Joaquin Valley Organic Farming Conferences which I initiated with Reedley College.
